### Introduction

Fayetteville has one of three National Cemeteries in Arkansas. The others are at Fort Smith and Little Rock.

The National Cemeteries in Arkansas are not so well known as those in Virginia and other eastern states. This is due to the fact that Arkansas has not told the nation about these hallowed burial grounds.

I am convinced that few people in Wisconsin, Iowa, Illinois and Indiana know that hundreds of soldiers from those states lost their lives in Civil War battles in northwest Arkansas and that their dust now reposes in a National Cemetery on an Ozarks hill.

This booklet is an attempt to remedy our earlier neglect. It contains the story of the founding and development of the Fayetteville National Cemetery. It also contains a list of the identified Union dead who fell in the battles of northwest Arkansas and who now sleep in Fayetteville soil. So far as I know, this is the first publication of the names of the Civil War dead in the National Cemetery.

I am grateful to Jack Howard, Superintendent of the National Cemetery, for giving me access to the Cemetery records. He has done considerable research on the history of this national burial ground and has shared his knowledge with me.

### National Cemeteries

There are 78 National Cemeteries in the United States, one in the City of Mexico, and one in Alaska, There are also American Military Cemeteries in foreign lands, for the dead of World Wars I and II.

National Cemeteries were first established following passage of an Act of Congress of February 22, 1867. The Fayetteville National Cemetery was opened shortly afterwards — on July 2, 1867. The National Cemeteries are under the jurisdiction of the War Department.

"These Cemeteries are an outgrowth of the Civil War when it became acutely apparent that some provision must be made for burial places for those who were killed in battle or died from wounds thereafter. To this end, National Cemeteries in the United States, and American Military Cemeteries in Europe, have been established with careful attention given to architectural feature, dotail of landscaping, and layout of burial sections so that the completed Cemeteries are a fitting memorial."

### The National Cemetery in Fayetteville, Arkansas

The National Cemetery in Fayetteville is one of three such cemeteries in Arkansas. The other two are at Fort Smith and Little Rock.

The Fayetteville Cemetery, at the south end of Government Avenue, was established in 1867. Most of the early burials were those of Union soldiers who fell in the battles of Pea Ridge in Benton County, Ark., (March 7-8, 1862) and Prairie Grove in Washington County, Ark. (December 7, 1862). These were, of course, re—interments at Fayetteville, since the soldier dead of the Civil War were usually buried on the field of battle. And since the United States did not acquire title to the Cemetery land until 1867, it is probably safe to assume that many of the Civil War dead reposed for five years or longer in graves at Pea Ridge, Cross Hollows, Keytesville, Cassville, Prairie Grove, Cane Hill, Rhea's Mill, Tollett's Orchard, Walker's Farm, and other places, all of which are named in the Cemetery records as "Original place of burial."

It would be difficult at this late date to ascertain the names and dates of the first burials in Fayetteville's National Cemetery. The earliest burials were probably Union soldiers who died in Fayetteville and were buried just south of town — on some land belonging to Stephen K. Stone, prominent local merchant. Stone had obtained the land in 1860 from Jane T. Butler. S. K. Stone was a public-spirited man and probably gave permission for burials on his land in 1862. It does not seem probable that the Federal government, in 1867, would have selected this place for a National Cemetery unless some soldier burials had already been made on the site. Also, the record shows that Fayetteville was the "original" place of burial for 103 "known" Union soldiers. The dead of Pea Ridge and Prairie Grove were buried on those fields and were not removed to Fayetteville until some years later.

Supposedly, the gravestones numbered from 1 to 7 were the first burials. These seven graves are in the point of the star at the north end of the Cemetery (Section 1). Six of the seven were officers. Five of the seven were members of Iowa regiments. Three of the seven died in March 1862 (probably Pea Ridge) and four died in December 1862 (probably Prairie Grove). All of which makes it appear that the soldiers who occupy graves 1 to 7 were brought to Fayetteville after the War and arbitrarily placed in the point of the star. It is, of course, possible that No. 1 was actually the first burial in the Cemetery, but it is doubtful. The record shows that this man died Dec. 7, 1862,—too late to have been first.

The first Union dead (known), who now sleep in Fayetteville's National Cemetery, are John A. Bishop and Thomas J. McDonald, both of whom were members of the 37th Illinois Infantry. They died January 18, 1862 and were originally buried at Cassville, Mo. There is no record of when their bodies were removed to Fayetteville.

The next seven graves in Section 1 are all Iowa soldiers. Their grave markers bear the following numbers and names:

All of these men, with the exception of Dickerson, were killed at Prairie Grove on December 7, 1862. Dickerson died at Keytesville, Mo., on October 28, 1862.

It is of course possible that after the engineers laid out the National Cemetery grounds in 1867, the point of the star that is Section l was the first section to be filled and that the graves were filled in the order of receipt of the bodies from Prairie Grove, Pea Ridge and elsewhere. There was, however, some re-shuffling of the burials in the early days - in order to make the burials conform to the starand-wheel layout of the Cemetery. Superintendent Howard calls attention to the legend that a considerable number ("several hundred") of Confederate dead were buried here and their remains removed "in the 1870's" to the Confederate Cemetery. There is no record to confirm this report.

While most of the burials of Civil War dead occurred in the decade following the establishment of the Cemetery in 1867, the records reveal that 28 unknown Union soldiers were re-interred here between 1893 and 1911. There have been no burials of "unknowns" since 1911, although human bones have been plowed up on the battlefield of Prairie Grove in more recent years.

A bronze tablet just inside the Cemetery entrance lists the total burials (as of 1867) as 1,975, of whom the number of "Known" is given as 465 and "Unknown" as 1,510. These figures are incorrect. The number of "Unknown" soldiers should be about 810. An error of 700 is serious, especially when cast in bronze. Although the error has been called to the attention of the authorities, the War Department will not permit removal of the marker.

The correct interment figures, as given in the records of the

various Superintendents, are as follows:

There have been no burials of "Unknown" soldiers since 1911. It is probably safe to assume that the 810 "Unknowns" were Civil War soldiers. Each of these 810 graves has a marble headstone marked "Unknown U.S. Soldier". The Cemetery record contains a page headed "The unknown are interred in the following marked graves", and gives these graves

This list totals 833, whereas the tabulation above shows 810. This slight discrepancy is not as serious as the 700 error on the government's official marker in the Cemetery — the marker that is supposed to give visitors correct information.

While this study is mainly concerned with the Civil War dead who are buried in the Fayetteville National Cemetery, it should be pointed out that the World Wars were responsible for most of the nearly 500 dead who have been added to the Cemetery's population in the past 20 years. On the following pages is a list of the "known" Civil War soldiers who are buried in the Fayetteville National Cemetery, who died during the war years (1862-1865). It is followed by a list of Civil War soldiers who died after the war. Many of the latter were from other states and came to this section years after the conflict. The last Civil War veteran to be buried in the Fayetteville National Cemetery was John Malott of Fayetteville who died in 1949.

(I had the pleasure of interviewing Mr. Malott on his 100th birthday. His memory of CivilWar events was clear. He enlisted in the 53rd Indiana Infantry and served throughout the war, being discharged July 21, 1865. His most vivid recollection was the "march through Georgia" under his favorite commander — red-bearded Sherman. — WJL)

The men who sleep in the Fayetteville National Cemetery came from many states. Including the dead of the two World Wars, the headstones now carry the names of 39 states.

The "known" Civil War soldiers who died in northwest Arkansas came from the following states:

Sixty-four of the 104 Arkansawyers who are buried in the National Cemetery were members of the 1st Arkansas Cavalry USA, commanded by Col. M. LaRue Harrison. This unit, composed chiefly of residents of Washington and Madison counties, participated in the battle of Prairie Grove but suffered most of its casualties while on occupation duty in Fayetteville in 1863 and 1864. Because the 1st Arkansas Cavalry was the most important Federal unit raised in northwest Arkansas, the names of its members who were killed in action or died during the Civil War are listed below, together with the date and place of death.

Although many of the casualties of Pea Ridge and Prairie Grove were returned to their home states for burial, the records reveal that 48 men of the 20th Wisconsin Infantry who fell at Prairie Grove now sleep in Fayetteville's National Cemetery; that the 37th Illinois Infantry suffered heavily at Pea Ridge and Prairie Grove; that the 26th Indiana Infantry Regiment left 17 identified dead in the Fayetteville National Cemetery as a reminder of Prairie Grove; and that Iowa is represented here by 42 of its sons who fell at Pea Ridge and 33 who fell at Prairie Grove. The Iowa units that suffered most heavily were the 9th, the 19th, the 20th Infantry, and the 3rd Cavalry.

A recapitulation of the known dead in the Fayetteville National Cemetery reveals the fact that 110 of them were killed in the battle of Pea Ridge; 20 lost their lives in the action at Cane Hill on December 5, 1862; and 144 were killed in the battle of Prairie Grove on December 7, 1862. There is, of course, no way of telling how many of the 810 unknown dead in the National Cemetery lost their lives in these engagements.

Jack Howard, who has been Superintendent of the National Cemetery for 26 years — a longer tenure than any of his 22 predecessors — has done considerable research into the history of this national burying ground. He furnished the information for the following article that appeared in the Northwest Arkansas Times:

"The men of Civil War days who laid out the Federal Cemetery, officially the National Military Cemetery, did not foresee the series of wars that would make their plan for 1,700 graves inadequate. Already 1,800 U.S. soldiers have been buried, and spaces for 1,866 more graves can be utilized.

The increased capacity of the cemetery was made possible by changing some of the features of the original design, and not by adding new land. The cemetery is still located on the original six acres at the end of Government Avenue.

The general plan of the cemetery is a six-point star, centered by a flagpole, and surrounded by a wheel. More grave space has been provided by making the points of the star into rectangles, and by widening the surrounding wheel. In addition, plots have been arranged in areas lying outside the wheel. Veterans of different wars are intermingled, and no distinction in place of burial is made between officers and enlisted men.

Any honorably discharged soldier or any soldier who died in service is eligible for burial in the cemetery. Women of the WACs, WAVEs, and other women's services are also eligible, but none is buried there yet. At present 56 wives of servicemen are buried with their husbands, and many wives' requests for future burial have been recorded with the superintendent. Until just recently wives have been buried in the same grave with their husbands; beginning in 1950 a plot beside the husband is provided.

Of the 1,800 in the National Cemetery, 207 served in World War I and 112 in World War II. Most of the World War II dead were brought back from overseas burial grounds.

The original osage orange hedge which surrounded the Cemetery was replaced by a brick wall in 1873-74. Bricks for the wall, which still stands, were hand molded and kilned three-fourths of a mile northwest of the cemetery grounds. Bricks for both the wall and the superintendent's lodge were made by Blackmer and Skelton, who also made bricks for Old Main at the University.

Several markers at the front gate inform visitors on government rulings for the cemetery. Under an 1875 ruling of the War Department, visitors are allowed only after sunrise and before sunset. The different visiting hours, according to the season, are posted outside the main gate. Another marker forbids picknicking inside the grounds and still another says that he speed of vehicles will be confined to a walk.

Lincoln's Gettysburg Address appears on a plaque near the front entrance. The address is always delivered at the Cemetery during Memorial Day services. The Legion Auxiliary is assisted by the Boy Scouts on Memorial Day in decorating the graves."

The Fayetteville National Cemetery was originally under control of old Fort Gibson, Indian Territory, in 1869; then at a later date was under the St.Louis Depot. On July 1, 1930, it was placed under control of the Commanding General, 7th Corps Area. In later years it has been under various jurisdictions. It is now (1956) under the supervision of the Quartermaster, Fort Chaffee, Arkansas.


The records reveal that there was a hedge of Osage Orange (bois d'arc) around the cemetery in 1871. The present brick wall, measuring 2,061 feet, was built about 1874. The brick lodge in which the Superintendent lives was built in 1870. The date on which the rostrum (of brick and iron) was built is unknown. The flag pole, 75 feet in height, was erected in 1924, replacing a 75-foot wood flag pole that had been erected in 1900 by Contractor A. M. Byrnes. The garage building was built in 1936. The entrance gates, of iron and granite, were completed in 1940.

The National Cemetery has several times been struck by disastrous storms. No records are available as to the damage done by the storms of earlier years, including the Fayetteville tornado of 1881. But on June 10, 1936, at 8 P.M., a near-tornado ruined 87 feet of brick wall, leveled 16 large trees, and stripped the metal roof from the Superintendent's lodge. The most recent storm damage was on April 30, 1954, when terrific winds uprooted a number of fine old trees.

Adjoining the National Cemetery on the south is Fayetteville's Negro burial ground, Oaks Cemetery (sometimes called Twin Oaks). This ground was a gift from Stephen K. Stone and his wife Amanda. By a deed dated July 4, 1867 they transferred one acre in the NW of Section 21 to Mary R. S. Lowe, Lafayette Gregg, E.D.Ham, Malloy, and William Story, "to be held in trust for the colored people of Washington County to be used for purposes of church or school house or any other purposes that will add to the mental and moral improvement of the colored people of said county."

An interesting legend which cannot be substantiated at this late date is that the hill now occupied by the National Cemetery was the site of legal executions in the late 1830's and 1840's. The noted Fayetteville writer, A. W. Arrington, locates "Gallows Hill" south of the town, and since Col. Archibald Yell had already built his home "Waxhaws" on the only other hill south of the town, before 1836, it is possible that the National Cemetery occupies the "Gallows Hill" site. The most notorious execution that took place here — if this was indeed the site — was the hanging in 1845 of a father mother and son for the murder of one Jonathan Selby.

### How the United States Acquired the Land

It is generally known that the United States purchased the land now included in the Fayetteville National Cemetery in 1867 from two prominent citizens of Fayetteville — Stephen K. Stone, merchant, and David Walker, lawyer and judge.

The attempt to trace what appears a simple real estate transfer provided one of the most interesting chapters in our research. Also, it gave the government some headaches 80 years ago.

The four deeds by which the U.S. acquired the National Cemetery land are the following:

May 20, 1867 - David Walker to U.S., part of SEt of NWt, 1.136 acres May 20, 1867 - David Walker to U.S., part of SWt of NEt, .157 acres May 20, 1867 - David Walker to U.S., part of NWt of NEt, .448 acres June 14,1867 - S.K.Stone to U.S., part of NEt of NWt, 3.248 acres

The total land acquired by these four deeds is 4.989 acres. Actually the area owned by the United States is 6.009 acres, of which approximately 5 1-3 acres are within the cemetery walls. The discrepancy is explained by errors in the earlier descriptions. These errors were corrected by the following deeds of later date:

Apr. 8, 1873 - S. K. Stone to U.S., part of NE1 of Nw2. (Deed Book K, page 195)

Feb. 3, 1875 - S. K. Stone to U.S., part of NEt of NW2. (Deed Book Y, page 315)

This transfer, covering about 2½ acres, includes the access road which was partly in Section 21 (in which the Cemetery is located) and partly in Section 16. This road, long known as Cemetery Street, but now called Government Avenue, was transferred by the U.S. to the City of Fayetteville on May 24, 1925.

Mar. 2, 1875 - David Walker to U.S., part of NW+ of NE+. (Deed Book Y, page 413)

This deed corrected an earlier error and added a plot of ground about 56 x 96 feet "at the northeast corner of the old cemetery survey." David Walker donated this piece of ground and received the following letter from the Secretary of War:

#### WAR DEPARTMENT

Washington City, May 21, 1875

David Walker, Esq., Fayetteville (through Qtr Mast Genl's Office)

Dear Sir:

In reply to communication from the Quartermaster General informing me of your donation to the U.S. of a portion of the land occupied by the National Cemetery at Fayetteville,

I with pleasure acknowledge your generosity, and in behalf of the

Government thank you for your very liberal gift.

Very respectfully yours, Wm. D. Belknap, Secretary of War It should be stated here that the U.S. government paid the prevailing market price for most of the land now included in the National .Cemetery — about \$100 an acre.

Although the deeds to the U.S. from Stone and Walker were recorded in 1867, it was not until two years later that the Attorney General discovered imperfections in the titles. The Chief Quartermaster at Fort Gibson, Cherokee Nation, under whose authority the National Cemetery at Fayetteville, had been placed, received the following letter and enclosures:

ATTORNEY GENERAL'S OFFICE Washington, D.C.

April 9, 1869

Sir: I have had under examination the title papers referred to this office by your Department on the 22nd of September last concerning the National Cemetery at Fayetteville, Ark.

It appears that the cemetery tract comprises the following contiguous parcels of land,

1st, Part of the SE Quarter of the NW Quarter of section 21 township

16 N 30 W.

2nd, Part of SW Quarter of the NE Quarter of same section 3rd, Part of NW quarter of the NE Quarter of same section 4th, Part of the NE quarter of the NW Quarter of the same section

A grant of the last mentioned parcel is made to the U.S. by Stephen K. Stone and wife, by deed of June 14th, 1867, whose title thereto is derived immediately from Jane T. Butler by a conveyance executed by her on the 14th of March 1860, but it is not stated whether the latter was at the date of this conveyance married or unmarried. This information should be supplied.

The other parcels are granted to the government by David Walker by deed of May 20, 1867. In support of this grantor's title to the 3rd parcel, a copy of a deed to him from A. Yell of 24 September 1845 is produced which however lacks authentication.

And as respects the first and second parcels, these seem to have been conveyed by Moses Campbell to Walker Feb. 20th, 1840 in trust for certain purposes. They were afterwards conveyed without any intermediate transfer being shown by W. A. Gasquet to James (Jonas) M. Tebbetts Jan. 17th, 1853 and by the latter and wife to Walker on the following day; while the 2nd parcel also appears to have been conveyed by Geo.T. Hebb and wife Oct. 28th, 1852 to Jane T. Butler from whom the papers show no subsequent transfer. The chain of title to the 1st and 2nd parcels thus appears to be very imperfect from want of evidence touching the transmission of title from the grantee in the trust deed aforesaid to Gasquet and to Hebb as regards both parcels, and from Jane T. Butler to Gasquet as regards one of them.

The papers are accordingly returned herewith in order that the deficiencies above suggested may be supplied. I have the honor to be

Hon. J. A. Rawlins Secretary of War The title was cleared in the deeds of 1873 and 1875 cited above.

Because of the historic importance of Section 21, we are giving below the names of the persons who originally entered land in this section and the date of their entry. All entries in this section were made from 1834 to 1836 — after Fayetteville had established itself as the county seat. It was more than a mile from what is now the National Cemetery to the log courthouse on the Square.

The first entry of land in Section 21 was made on Nov. 28, 1834, by one James Weems. On that same day, Weems sold his entry to A. Yell. Nothing else is known of Weems. He may have been a Tennesseean who was acting as agent for Yell. Archibald Yell, of course, became the first Congressman and second Governor of the State of Arkansas. On Aug. 22, 1836, Yell's wife Maria secured a patent to the  $NW_{4}^{1}$  of the  $NE_{4}^{1}$  of Section 21, a small part of which  $(\frac{1}{2} \text{ acre})$  was to become a part of the future National Cemetery.

James M. Sweeney, who made the original entry of the  $SW_{\frac{1}{4}}^{\frac{1}{4}}$  of the  $NE_{\frac{1}{4}}^{\frac{1}{4}}$  of Section 21 (a fraction of which is included in the National Cemetery), was an inconspicuous figure in the early history of Fayetteville. Little is known about him.

Dennis Callahan, who entered the  $N_2^1$  of the  $N_4^1$  of Section 21 on Dec. 25, 1835, was an extensive land owner in both Washington and Benton counties. The Callahans later settled on the site of what is now the city of Rogers. Dennis Callahan's importance in the story of the Fayetteville National Cemetery lies in the fact that the biggest part of the Cemetery ( $3\frac{1}{4}$  acres) lies in his original entry of 1835. Stephen K. Stone, who sold this land to the U.S. in 1867, did not acquire ownership of it until 1860.

Other original entrants of land in Section 21 were Ludovick Brodie, whose daughter was to become the wife of Stephen K. Stone; Moses Campbell, pioneer citizen of Fayetteville and early Mayor of the town; and Onesimus Evans. Evans was one of Fayetteville's public-spirited citizens of the early days — lawyer, promoter and first Master of what is now Washington Lodge No. 1, F&AM, the oldest Masonic Lodge in Arkansas. He later removed to Texas.

Between the time of the original entry of these lands until their sale to the U.S., the story of Section 21 is one of mortgages, trusts and transfers, in some of which agents acted a part. For example, David Walker secured possession of some of the land on Jan. 18, 1853, from Jonas M. Tebbetts, influential pioneer lawyer, who was acting on behalf of one Gasquet, a Missouri merchant. Gasquet had deeded the land to Tebbetts on Jan. 17, the day before the transfer to Walker. (Power of Attorney from Gasquet to Tebbetts is recorded in Deed Book H, page 242). Other shadowy figures who appear in these early real estate transfers are Jane T. Butler and George T. Hebb, both Missourians but with Fayetteville connections that are not clear.
